History of the UN Millennium Development Goals (MDGs)

- September 8, 2000: UN Millennium Declaration
- 8 MDGs
 - Eradicate Extreme Poverty & Hunger
 - Achieve Universal Primary Education
 - Promote Gender Equality & Empower Women
 - Reduce Child Mortality
 - Improve Maternal Health
 - Combat HIV/AIDS, Malaria, & Other Diseases
 - Ensure Environmental Sustainability
 - Global Partnership for Development
- 2015: Target year to accomplish MDGs



What are Goals 4 & 5?

- Goal 4: Reduce Child Mortality
 - A. Reduce 1990 child mortality rate by 2/3
 - 1990:12.4 million child mortalities
 - **2014:** ~1/2
 - 5 million occur 1st year of life
- Goal 5: Improve Maternal Health
 - A. Reduce 1990 maternal mortality rate by ¾
 - 1990: 543,000 maternal deaths
 - **2014:** ~1/2
 - B. Universal access to reproductive health

Why Do I Care About These MDGs?



- Students United for Reproductive Justice (SURJ)
- Reproductive Justice: Every woman's human right to...
 - not have a child
 - have a child
 - raise her child in a safe and healthy environment
- Reproductive justice is a human right

Globally

Maternal Health

- 2012: 800 maternal deaths EVERY day
- Majority in Sub-Saharan Africa & South Asia
- 80% result from avoidable complications
 - bleeding, infections, eclampsia, unsafe abortion

Infant Mortality


- 2012: more than 13,500 deaths EVERY day
- The main causes of death are often preventable
 - Pneumonia, diarrhea, malaria, under nutrition



Nationally: United States

Maternal Health

- US ranks 50th
- Rates have increased!
 - 1990→2010:
 - 12→21 maternal deaths/100,000 live births
- Causes: lack of access to medical care, Cesarean sections, discrimination
- African Americans: 3-4 times more likely
- Impoverished: 2 times more likely



Nationally: United States

Infant Mortality

- In 2011, US ranked 40th
- Rates have slowly decreased
 - **1990-2010**
 - 9.2→ 6 infant deaths/ 1,000 live births
- Causes: congenital malformations, premature birth,
 Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS), maternal complications
- African American infants are 2.5 times more likely to experience infant mortality

Locally: North Carolina

Maternal Mortality

- 2010: ranked 37th out of 50 States
- 2010: 11.4 maternal mortalities/ 100,000 live births

Infant Mortality

- 2010: ranked 37th out of 50 States
- 2010: 7 infant deaths/ 1,000 live births
 - Higher than national rate
- Race and class disparities



Solutions

- Educate mothers
- Bring resources to women's communities

Educate Mothers

- "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world" –Nelson Mandela
- Educate mothers on beneficial health behaviors
 - Breastfeed first 6 months
 - Wash hands
 - Sleep on back
 - Back to Sleep Campaign 1994



Bring Resources to Women's Communities

- Women that belong to vulnerable groups
 - Poor, rural women; women in poor urban areas
 - Variety of factors
 - transportation, funds, knowledge of resources
- Successes
 - Health Extension Program Ethiopia (2004)
 - Achieved goal to reduce child mortality by 2/3
 - Mobile Women's Health Van California (1999)
 - Prenatal care 3 weeks earlier

Local Best Practice Model



Durham Connects

- Mission: "to increase child well being by bridging the gap between parent needs and community resources"
- Care for mother
 - Family planning
 - Screen for: drug abuse, domestic violence, depression
- Care for infant
- Bring together proposed solutions

Results

- Greater connections to community resources
- Lower levels of anxiety
- 82% fewer overnights at hospital with infants
- 34% less infant emergency medical care
- Investment of \$2.2 million/ year leads to savings of \$6.7 million/ year


