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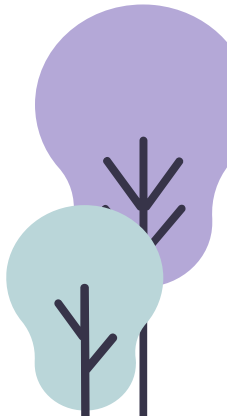

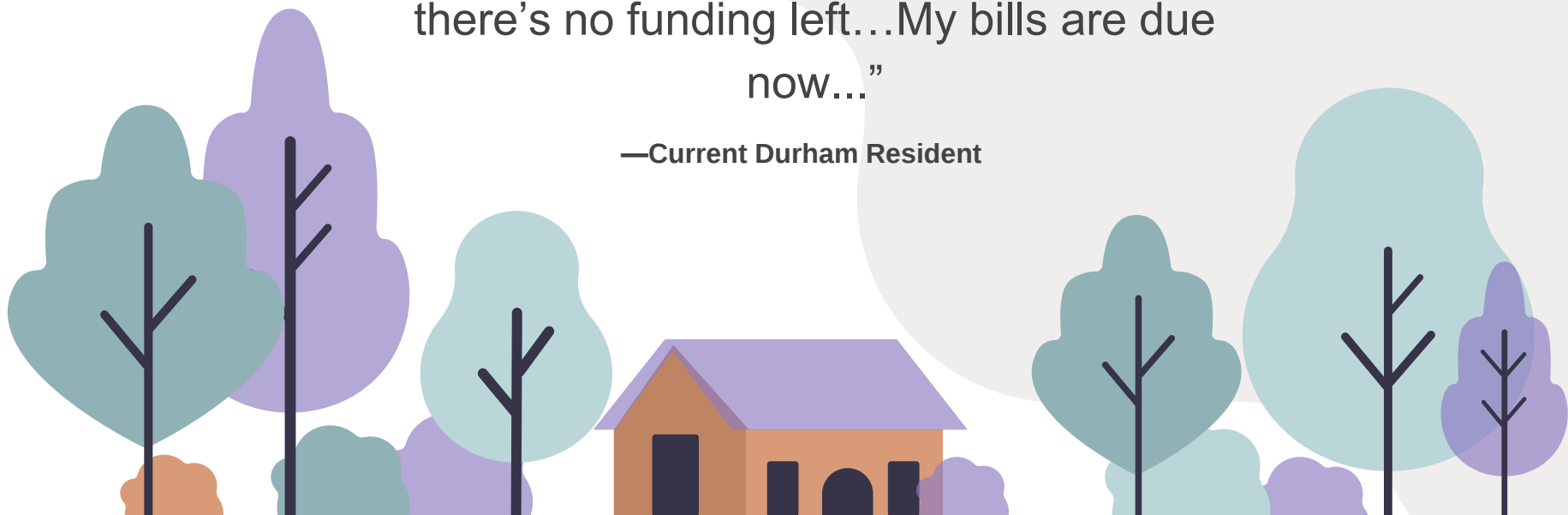

QUANTITY OF RENTERS

45.6% of households in Durham, North Carolina rent.

HOMELESSNESS

On any given night, 590 people experience homelessness in Durham.

“The main risk factors of eviction for women are low wages, having children, domestic violence, and gender dynamics between male landlords and female tenants.” (DataWorksNC)



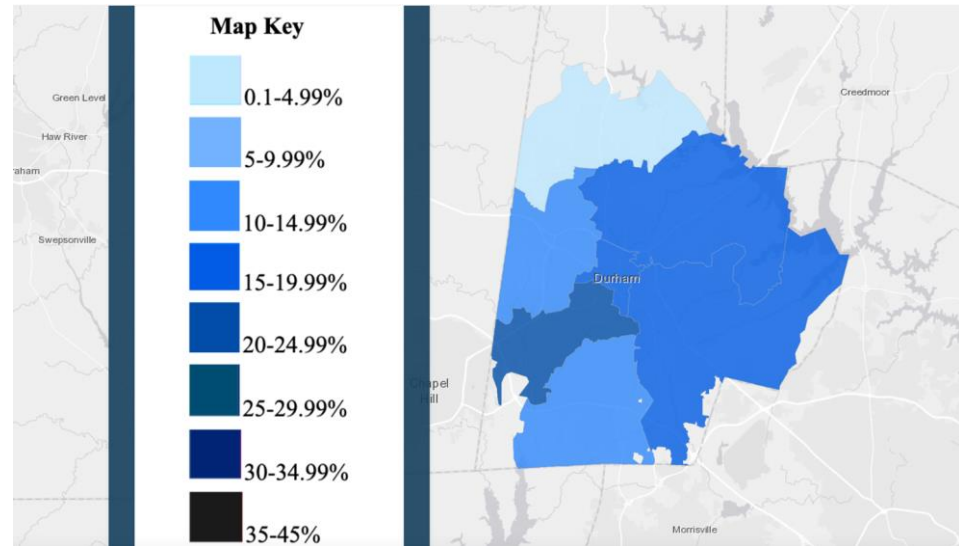

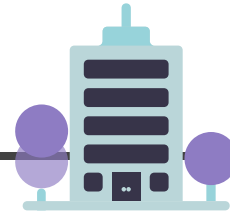

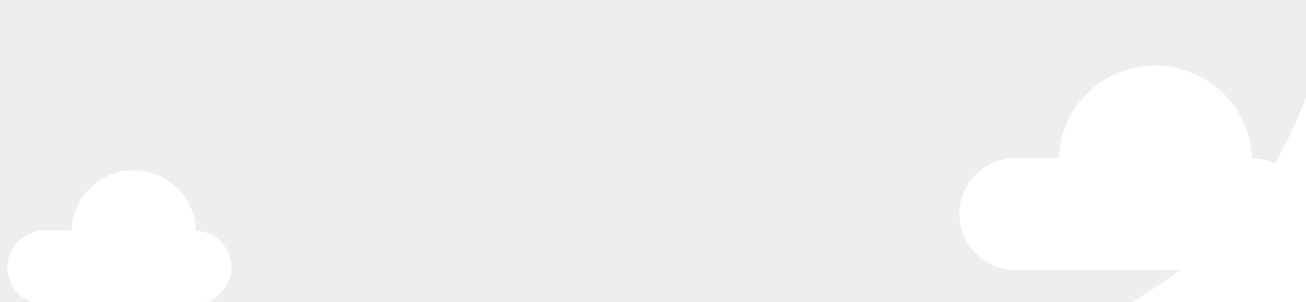
