BACKGROUND

Nearly **10**% of all U.S. undergraduate students **are single mothers**.

28% of single mothers have some college education, but no degree



Only 33% of postsecondary students who have children are expected to graduate with a degree within six years

WHY DOES THIS MATTER?



Getting a college degree leads to...

- Immediate improvements to quality of life
- · Legacy of success for children
- Benefits for national/state economies

"PREDICTORS OF SUCCESS AMONG SINGLE-PARENT STUDENTS ARE NOT INVARIANT PERSONAL CHARACTERISTICS THAT LIE OUTSIDE OF THE INFLUENCE OF INTERVENTION.. RATHER, THEY APPEAR TO BE BEHAVIORS WELL WITHIN THE SCOPE OF INFLUENCE OF PROGRAMS THAT CAN BE CREATED BY INSTITUTIONS, NON-PROFITS, SCHOLARSHIP FUNDERS, AND OTHERS."

METHODOLOGY

The recommendations made in this presentation are the product of a literature review conducted of both peer-reviewed and gray literature published between 1993 and 2022.

- Aims: to identify both
 - barriers that single mother students are facing
 - proposed solutions combatting those barriers.
- **Databases used**: Google Scholar, Education Resources Information Center (ERIC), and the Duke University Libraries research database.
- Primary search terms employed: "single mothers community colleges," "single mother students," and "student parents community college."
